

Coronavirus Logistics Impact Survey: 20 March 2020

FTA's weekly Coronavirus Logistics Impact Survey focuses on identifying how operators and purchasers of logistics transport services are dealing with the coronavirus pandemic.

The first survey, conducted between 17 and 19 March 2020, had **553** respondents spanning over **14** sectors in the UK – 38% were small businesses with less than 50 employees, while over one-third were large businesses with more than 250 staff. The majority (91%) were concerned with domestic trade only and over half of them were operators of logistics transport services, with just over one-third being both operators and users of logistics transport services.

What changes have the majority of organisations implemented?*

Remote working from home to avoid human contact

Measures in place to deal with coronavirus' impact:

Handwashing/hygiene facilities as per national recommendations

Reducing face-to-face contact with customers/suppliers

Emergency communication plan 70%


Business continuity plan 66%

What impact is the coronavirus currently having on businesses?



Government measures that would help:

- Provide financial support through cash, loans or grants to ensure cash-flow.
- Increase statutory sick pay and cover it for longer.
- Support on PAYE, National Insurance, VAT, business rates and Corporation Tax through payment breaks or deferrals.
- Defer business loan repayments.
- · Relax and extend drivers' hours rules.
- Extend inspections and MOT test dates.

FTA's asks of government:

- Recognition of the logistics sector as emergency/critical service (link to care, access to facilities, movement over borders, etc).
- Relaxation in restrictions on delivery hours by local authorities to allow re-stocking.
- Safe and appropriate easements in drivers' hours.
- Government-supported industry-wide contingency planning to address shortages in drivers, vehicle testing, vocational licence acquisition testing, completion of Driver CPC training and medical assessments for vocational licence renewal.
- Clearer government advice to the public on scenario planning, to limit panic buying.
- Consideration of packages of appropriate financial help.

Other impacts expected:

Fall in going out of business

General business downturn (orders cancelled)

Customers going out of business

Lack of MOT/ADR testing and inspections
